First the bad news: Liberian peace activistLeymah Gbowee will probably not be coming to NJIT this December to speak, as we had hoped...because (and here comes the good news) she is going to Oslo, Norway, to accept the 2011 Nobel Peace Prize!

Gbowee shares the prize with two other equally extraordinary women: <u>Dr. Ellen Johnson Sirleaf</u>, the president of Liberia, and Yemeni human rights activist <u>Tawakkul Karman</u>. The three were honored jointly by the <u>Nobel Committee</u> "for their nonviolent struggle for the safety of women and for women's rights to full participation in peace-

building work. We cannot achieve democracy and lasting peace in the world unless women obtain the same opportunities as men to influence developments at all levels of society," the Committee noted.

Gbowee was the leader of the 2002-2003 women's peace movement that, against overwhelming odds, helped to topple Liberian warlord Charles Taylor and to elect Sirleaf president--a series of events chronicled in <a href="Abigail Disney's">Abigail Disney's</a> powerful documentary film, <a href="Pray the Devil Back to Hell">Pray the Devil Back to Hell</a> (2008). Gbowee is one of the women activists featured in Disney's new five-part TV documentary series, <a href="Women, War and Peace">Women, War and Peace</a>, to be aired on PBS starting on Tuesday, October 11. With passion and precision, she challenges the conventional image of women in war as passive victims. "These are fighters, survivors," she stresses. Her new book, <a href="Mighty Be Our Powers">Mighty Be Our Powers</a>, makes the same crucial point, cautioning women not to underestimate the impact they already have in their individual lives--and the even greater impact they can have if they work together for social change. "Don't say, 'Oh, I can't do it, or it's not within my reach to do it," Gbowee says. "My challenge to you...is to rise up. Whether it's in your backyard, your front yard or your office: DO SOMETHING. Mighty be our powers! I'm not just talking about the powers of Liberian women or African women, but about the unique power that each and every woman possesses."

At the Murray Center, we share Gbowee's fundamental sense of optimism and work in our academic backyard everyday to help NJIT women find their own unique powers. Please join us this month in celebrating the achievements of Gbowee, Sirleaf, and Karman--and join us throughout the year as we discover new ways to support each other in fulfilling our impossible dreams.



### NJIT Women to Watch

Each September at the University Convocation, outstanding members of the faculty and student body are recognized for their contributions to the NJIT community.

Phyllis Bolling, director of the Center for Counseling and Psychological Services (C-CAPS) at NJIT, received the Constance A. Murray Diversity Award. Constance A. Murray, who served as NJIT's Dean of Student Services from 1978 until her death in 1994, was a dedicated educator and humanitarian who devoted her life to enhancing opportunities for all people, especially minorities and women. The award is presented to individuals or groups within NJIT who have compiled a significant and sustained record of achievement in fostering diversity within the university community.

Katia Passerini, an associate professor in the NJIT School of Management, was presented with the prestigious honor of "Master Teacher" at NJIT's University Convocation. Dr. Passerini was recognized for her curriculum-building initiatives and far-reaching pedagogical grants that have supported industry-driven course development. In 2010 she received the Excellence in Innovative Teaching Award for experimenting with team-based teaching models.

**Daisy Gallegos**, a 2011 graduate of NJIT's College of Computing Sciences, received the Presidential Leadership Award. Currently a master's degree candidate at NJIT, Gallegos distinguished herself as a scholar, athlete and as president of the Society of Hispanic Professional Engineers (SHPE).
