
# A Message from the Director

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We facilitate interdisciplinary research collaborations among women faculty researchers and their male peers, working in partnership with **NJIT ADVANCE**, a 3-year program funded by the National Science Foundation. (See page 3.)

We collaborate with the **NJIT Committee on Women's Issues** in sponsoring brown-bag lunch programs for staff—for example, our timely series on financial planning strategies. And we advocate for policies that help members of the NJIT community achieve a better work/life balance.

The Murray Center encourages the continued integration of gender into the curriculum and cosponsors seminars and workshops on a range of gender/technology and career issues. ## NJIT/ADVANCE



NJIT ADVANCE, an Institutional Transformation program funded by a grant from the National Science Foundation (NSF), works to decrease the isolation that women in science and engineering often experience. ADVANCE integrates new social networking technology with traditional faceto-face networks, linking women faculty to each other and to male peers in ways that expand social and professional connections, improve information flow, and increase the representation of women in leadership positions within the university community

In its ongoing effort to support Women-Led Research Teams, ADVANCE has thus far provided over \$350,000 in research seed money and travel grants to 21 faculty members in ten departments. ADVANCE also supports the work of a number of graduate and undergraduate research assistants. ADVANCE-funded research teams include the Geospatial Technologies group, consisting of women faculty from four disciplines; two bioapplications projects involving a chemist, a physicist, and a biologist; biomedical research designed to help restore function to veterans and others with traumatic brain injuries; and research designed to assess the environmental risks of nanotechnology.

To foster interdisciplinary collaboration, AD-VANCE sponsored a five-part seminar series in 2007-2008, focusing on cross-cutting research areas. The ADVANCE team also held small-group discussions and workshops for assistant professors seeking research resources and collaborative partnerships. Focusing on efforts to improve the recruitment and retention of women faculty, the

ADVANCE team attended and convened national seminars, made presentations on best practices to the university's Committee on Academic Affairs and the Deans' Council. In addition, ADVANCE developed faculty search committee toolkits and constructed websites on Work/Life Balance and Dual Career Resources.

This fall, ADVANCE is completing construction and testing of an interactive faculty publications database. Using information obtained from the database and from the project's Networks Survey, ADVANCE will then map the professional networks of individual faculty members and analyze the collaborative

This was followed by a "How to Survive Your First Semester at NJIT" workshop held during Freshman Move-In weekend where

Ambassadors acted out real life scenarios that might occur during their first semester at NJIT and discussed several options on how to handle

In collaboration with the NJIT Center for Academic and Professional Enrichment, the Ambassadors held study sessions before each common exam. First year students and Ambassadors also attended an off campus trip to the Bodies

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### The Committee on Women's Issues (CWI)

he Committee on Women's Issues (CWI) was created in 1992 by then-president Saul K. Fenster to address the needs of women faculty and administrators at a technological university. For over 15 years, the committee has worked to improve the climate for NJIT women, including recommending specific policy changes to ensure gender equity.

Since its creation, the CWI has developed and successfully advocated for a number of diversity and work/life balance initiatives, including:

- a series of finance workshops on how to manage your finances during the current financial meltdown;
- A lactation room for nursing mothers

equipped with comfortable chairs, pumping equipment and refrigerator.

One of the committee's main objectives is to support the success of women at NJIT by increasing opportunities for networking and community building. As part of this effort, the CWI cosponsors a number of events each year, including

- a Welcome Breakfast which introduces new NJIT women employees to their peers;
- a mid-year celebration to raise money for the CWI undergraduate women's scholarship fund.
- a spring skills-based workshop on career advancement strategies and resources;

 brown-bag seminars for women faculty and staff throughout the year on such topics as personal financial management and leadership and maximizing your professionalism.
CWI members also serve as mentors, helping new women employees to adjust to their positions.

Interested in the work the CWI is doing? If so, consider joining. Meetings are held twice a month. The Committee membership includes student, faculty, and staff representatives. ## **Women Engineers in Advanced Positions (WEAAP)**

n January 2008, NJIT served as the venue for the "Women Engineers in Advanced Academic Positions (WEAAP): Effecting Change in Higher Education" workshop. With funding from the National Science Foundation, Priscilla P. Nelson conceived of and convened the workshop in response to heightened concerns about the future of engineering colleges across the nation and to consider how these concerns intersect with issues of gender and diversity in the field.

The workshop brought together women administrators from 17 US states and Canada, representing 18 public and 7 private institutions ranging in enrollment from 2,300 to 50,000. Three specific issues of concern emerged in the workshop proceedings: the on-going difficulty in recruiting women into under

graduate and graduate education in many fields of engineering, the continuing isolation experienced by women in non-life-science engineering and technology professions in all sectors (academe, government and industry), and the change for public universities regarding decreased state appropriations, rising salaries, capped tuition and the resultant drive toward alternative funding sources.

WEAAP activities did not end with the close of the 2-day WEAAP workshop. The WEAAP members continue both formal and informal networking, and a panel session dedicated to the WEAAP workshop and on-going activities is set to take place at the ASEE Annual Conference & Exposition in June 2009.

patterns of selected academic departments. These dynamic maps will allow researchers to better understand the structure of "invisible colleges" within the university and to analyze changes in organizational culture, as well as to provide feedback to faculty engaged in promotion and tenure.

In March and April 2009, ADVANCE will bring nationally-recognized work/life balance expert **Dr.** 

Joan Williams to campus for a workshop with faculty and administrators. ADVANCE will also host an interactive workshop designed to assist faculty administrators in creating discipline-specific effective management strategies in problematic areas.
